INTRODUCING "A HOUSE FOR THE 21ST CENTURY" CAMPAIGN

Brothers.

As you think back to your years at Cornell, I am sure that you were always proud of our chapter house. Close your eyes and picture the beautiful, powerful, imposing structure that stood out among all the chapter houses on campus; savor the fond memories of your undergraduate years. The one flaw in this picture is the hostile environment of Upstate New York, and heavy use by an active, growing chapter has taken its toll on this fragile wooden structure. The current Gamma Chapter House Association board of directors has been trying to maintain the house through a variety of periodic improvements over the past two years as was done over the previous 18 years, but we have come to realize that we need to make some major capital improvements to preserve the building.

In 1989, a similar assessment was made; a group of very dedicated brothers came together and conducted a successful capital campaign to revitalize portions of the house. We are at the point where we need to undertake a similar effort. Following an evaluation by a professional architectural firm,

the board has identified six major capital projects that must be addressed. None of these projects could be completed on a timely basis solely utilizing the current cash flow of the association. We considered doing a series of capital campaigns over time to address each project individually, but we

concluded this would be inefficient from a cost standpoint and disconcerting to the brotherhood. We decided that the best approach is to come to you only one time this generation to fix what needs to be fixed and create a "A House for the 21st Century," of which we, as a brotherhood, can be proud.

We obtained estimates for the required renovations, and they total \$494,000. This significant amount cannot be raised without a lot of involvement from the brotherhood. I want you to know I am an old-school guy. I couldn't ask you for a dime if I hadn't put up money first, so I have given the first \$5,000 toward this renovation. This motivated four other committed Phi Sig alumni to give, and together, we have sufficient funds to more than cover the associated costs of the fundraising. Therefore, you can be assured that every dollar you

give will go directly to the capital improvements of the chapter house. Next, I would add that we have four early donors of significant amounts who have challenged others to join them with a significant gift in order to leverage the initial success of the campaign.

So, we are on our way, but we are still very much in the initial planning phase of the campaign and need your help. If you have any experience in raising funds, whether it was for your church, charity, private school, or some other cause, we would like to hear from you. I am very fortunate that the board happens to have a preponderance of business skills, legal acumen, and management capabilities that go far beyond what you would expect of a simple fraternal association, but charitable fundraising is an entirely different matter. We welcome your advice and input as we structure the final strategy of this campaign so that it best fits into the ethos of our brotherhood. We will keep you apprised of our progress, and—at the appropriate time—we will solicit you personally for your support.




